



Nothing of value in our lives comes without someone or some group first paying the price expressed not in dollars but one of time, commitment, and dedication. In Freemasonry this is especially true. Before any degree can be conferred some Brothers must plan, coordinate and memorize that which is necessary to complete the work. This was true when we petitioned our Symbolic Lodge, and it is true today. Consider all the ways Brethren must be involved for our Fraternity to progress. There are:

- * Brethren who are always anxious to extend the hand and smile of genuine friendship.
- *Brethren who take out time from their busy personal activities to visit an ailing Brother in the hospital, nursing facility or at home.
- *Brethren who regularly attend the meetings and participate in the activities of the Order, whether or not they are officers
- * Brethren who secure and submit petitions of candidates and thereby help insure the continuance and growth of our Order.
- * Brethren who pay their dues as promptly as possible to avoid causing the administrative officer extra work and the organizations embarrassment in paying its financial obligations.
- * Brethren who are always anxious to congratulate others on work well done and encourage those who have become discouraged or disinterested.
- *Brethren who answer "yes" when asked to be an officer or to actively participate and then, learn their work thoroughly
- * Brethren who avail themselves of every convenient opportunity to visit meetings and activities of other Masonic organizations, so as to gain and


All are invited to attend this event. All we ask is that you inform the Secretary in advance (by phone or email) of the number in your party in order that we may provide the appropriate amount of vittles.
